You + Art Installations in Tysons

Starting June 25, 2015 you can see the results from 1,000 audience responses visually translated in two public art installations in Tysons.



Fairfax County, VA – Starting June 25 until August 3, 2015, Tysons' residents, workforce, and visitors will be able to see responses from 1,000 participants displayed in two public art installations located at Greensboro Green and Tysons West and the responses will be illuminated in LED lights on the exterior of the Silverline Center building.

"The objectives of the project are to raise awareness about the arts, share community opinions in an innovative way, enhance place making, and to gain

insight about interest in future arts amenities in Tysons," said Linda S. Sullivan, president & CEO, of the Arts Council of Fairfax County.

Artist Julia Vogl engaged, during the month of May, with 1,000 respondents using her *Tysons Tiles* art trolley, a custom developed app, and three questions that investigated the individual's role in the community, opinions on culture, and a fun fact about them, at 27 different locations in Tysons. According to Vogl: "I was impressed with how diverse Tysons is; ethnically, socioeconomically, and in age. Tysons has the potential to be culturally very rich because there are so many stories and traditions to draw from." The data was digitally recorded and amalgamated for the culminating ground mural art installations at Greensboro Green and Tysons West which will be on public display starting June 25, 2015. "While trends of certain answers did emerge, I was more interested in the conversations and logic people stated to back up their decisions. A great many people shared their personal history with Tysons. I look forward to all visiting the murals and creating their own analysis of the patterns. Tysons is certainly a colorful place," Vogl continued.

Tysons Tiles trolley participants received a custom designed pin consisting of a design which corresponded with their answers and a number by which they will be contacted with a specific time to view their responses illuminated on the exterior of the Silverline Center building between June 25 and August 3, 2015.

The app questions have been embedded in an online engagement tool and you can provide feedback on the arts and culture in Tysons through August 3, 2015.
