ARTS & CULTURE SECTOR'S PERCENTAGE OF U.S. ECONOMY (Artists, University Arts, Commercial & Nonprofit Arts Organizations Combined)

## ARTS & CULTURE SECTOR REPRESENTS 4.5% OF NATION'S GDP & 5.1 MILLION JOBS

The U.S. Bureau of Economic Analysis reports that nationally the arts and culture sector is a **\$878 billion industry**, representing 4.5% of the nation's GDP- a larger share of the economy than construction or education services.

### VIRGINIA ARTS & CULTURE SECTOR REPRESENTS 3.5% OF STATE'S GDP & 123,395 JOBS

The U.S. Bureau of Economic Analysis reports that the arts and culture sector contributes **\$17.9 billion** to Virginia's economy, representing 3.5% of the state's GDP- a larger share than some other industries in the state.

#### **LOSS OF REVENUE AND JOBS** (Commercial & Nonprofit Arts Organizations Combined)

Nationally, COVID-19 has devastated creative economy businesses with a loss of **\$150 billion** in revenue. In addition, creative workers made up **52% of the unemployed population** (2.7 million people) through July 2020.

#### ECONOMIC IMPACT OF NONPROFIT ARTS ORGANIZATIONS & THEIR AUDIENCES

Nationally, the nonprofit arts industry alone generates **\$166.3 billion in** economic activity annually that supports 4.6 million jobs and generates **\$27.5** billion in federal, state, and local government revenue.

• Spending by arts audiences generated **\$102.5 billion** to local businesses.

NONPROFIT **ART** IS A

DRIVER OF OUR NATIONAL, STATE & LOCAL ECONOMY.

In 2015, Virginia arts and culture sector employed **thousands of FTE jobs** and generated **millions of dollars in economic activity**. Nonprofit arts groups helped cultivate that activity.

• In **Richmond** and the Tri-Cities Region nonprofit arts groups generated **\$211.7 million** in economic activity. Audiences of 5.9 million people added another **\$148.4 million** in related spending for a total of **\$360.1 million** for the city in 2015, and this generated **\$31.6** million in local and state government revenues and **10,702** FTE jobs.

#### PUBLIC INVESTMENT IN GRANTS TO NONPROFIT ARTS ORGANIZATIONS & ARTISTS

So how much is the federal government investing in the **National Endowment for the Arts (NEA)?** 

Congress allocated **\$167.5 million** to the NEA in FY 2021, which has been relatively level for the last several years. This amounts to just 51¢ per capita, yet the nonprofit arts industry generates over \$13 billion in federal tax revenue back to the U.S. Treasury. Imagine what nonprofit arts groups could generate with \$1 per capita.

What about Virginia—how much does state government budget to the Virginia Commission on the Arts each year?

In **FY 20-21**, the state allocated **\$5,638,134** to the Virginia Commission on the Arts. The Virginia Commission on the Arts also received **\$760,000** in federal NEA funds, which the Commission re-granted to hundreds of cultural organizations throughout the state. Another **65** nonprofit arts organizations received direct grants from the NEA totaling \$1,712,500.
